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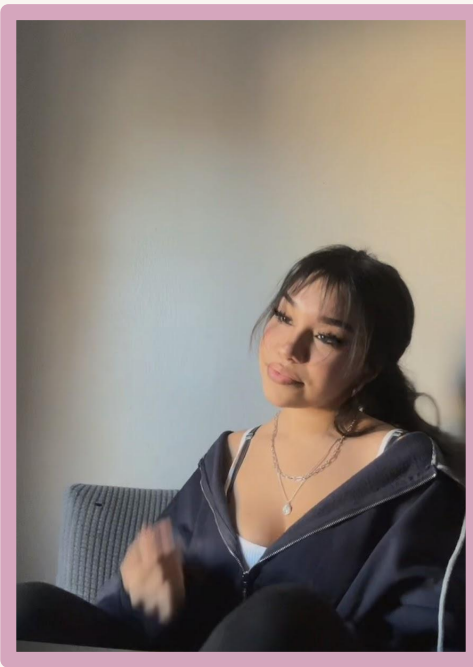

1. What kind of environment is most susceptible to bullying?
1. Do you think society takes cyber bullying as seriously as in person/face-to-face bullying?
1. Do you believe that cyber bullying affects the victims as much as face to face bullying?

Statistics

- Some 54% of girls from the ages 15 to 17 have experienced at least one of the six cyber bullying behaviors
- One out of every five (20.2%) students report being bullied
- 69.1% of teens have shared cyber bullying negatively impacted their feelings about themselves
- 23% of African- American students, 23% Caucasian students, 16% of Hispanic student, and 7% of Asian student report they have experienced bullying in a school environment.
- 75% of school shootings have been linked to harassment and bullying

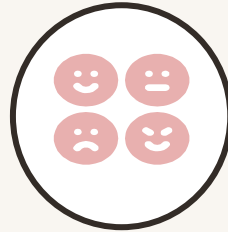

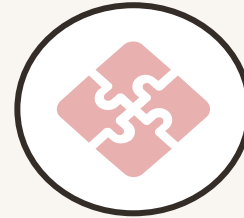

*Have a harder time learning



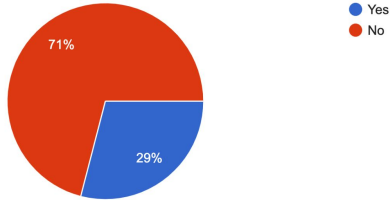


Effects on individuals

62 responses



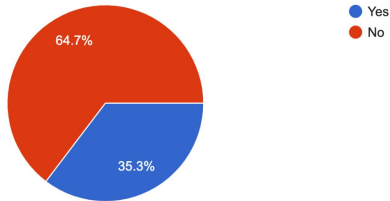
When asked about having to reporting a bullying incident, 71% of participants, answered no.



Why wouldn't students want to report a traumatic incident? With a lack of trust with their guidance counselors and teachers, students feel that they aren't taken seriously, as well as feeling that their school doesn't address bullying effectively enough to even bother trying to reach out for help.

We see this when 64.7% participants answered 'no' to the question "Does your school effectively address bullying"

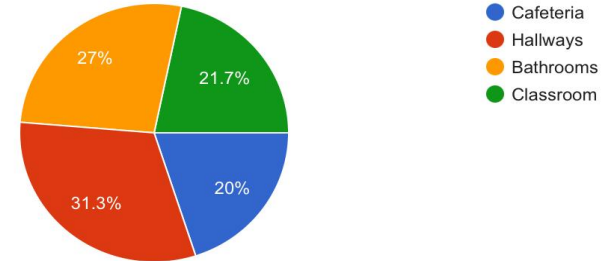
When we asked participants, “What area in the school is the most susceptible to bullying” **Hallways** 31.3% with the cafeteria, bathrooms, and classrooms having similar

- When we asked participants how often they experience bullying daily, 24.1% of participants said that they experience bullying daily on 1-3 occasions



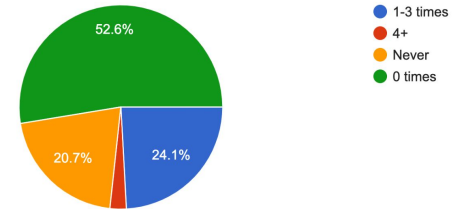
What area in the school is the most susceptible for students to be bullied?

Among the many answers from participants, the most common response came back to be "yes, I would because bullying leaves a harmful impact on my friends and I trust my friends would defend me too."





Our Thoughts



Action Plan

After our research, we found that 64.2% of our participants agreed that schools do not effectively solve bullying, admin, counselors, teachers, need to listen to students and their feelings, and actually understand the core problem. In other words, we concluded that our school, rather than solving this problem so that there is an actual solution between the bully and the student, our school "solves" our bullying cases by only following the "protocol" without thinking about the physical and psychological damage that there is from background

What can we do?

- **Share data with district Personnel**
- **Create a PSA regarding bullying (in process)**
- **Share our research district wide (visit schools, classrooms to share our work)**
